## FROM THE PRINCIPAL



To all in our Emmaus Community, welcome to the 2016 school year!

I am delighted to be greeting you all in my first newsletter as principal of Emmaus College. For the past eleven years I have held the role of principal at St Patrick's College in Mackay, a college for Year 11

and 12 students and I am excited to once again be amongst so many young people across such a diverse age range!

School communities are vibrant environments and I believe all of us who contribute to the growth of our young people are 'magic weavers'. We are charged with guiding our young people in such a crucial period of their lives, and are privileged to be able to make a real difference through our interactions with them.

## Commencement of Lent next week

The liturgical season of Lent begins with Ash Wednesday next week. It is preceded by Shrove Tuesday, sometimes referred to as Mardi Gras (which literally means "Fat Tuesday"), Carnivale (farewell to meat) or Pancake Tuesday. Shrove Tuesday in Catholic Christian tradition was the day before the Lenten season of fasting and abstinence leading up to the Easter celebrations. Because they would be fasting and abstaining from meat products households would empty their cupboards and feast up on the last day prior to Lent beginning.

In 2016 Pope Francis tells us:

The season of Lent during this Jubilee Year should be lived more intensely as a privileged moment to celebrate and experience God's mercy. The readings are from the Gospel of Luke; the 'gospel of mercy'. On the Fourth Sunday the reading is the parable of the two sons, the third of the 'lost and found parables' (Luke 15:1-32). In these parables we find the core of the Gospel. (9, 17)

- Pope Francis (*The Face of Mercy, Misericordiae Vultus*)

At Emmaus next week we will celebrate Pancake Tuesday with pancake making activities. Ash Wednesday will be celebrated with a liturgy on each campus.

## FROM THE DIRECTOR OF CAMPUS – SENIOR SCHOOL

### Start to the Year

There has been a positive start to the year on Main Street by the large majority of students. The uniform expectations have been reinforced with the students and it would be appreciated if you could support us in encouraging students to present correctly every day. If your son or daughter is considering a subject change they need to ensure the form is completed as soon as possible and an interview with Ms Sommerfeld is organised prior to the form being processed by Ms Owens. If you have any questions or concerns about any matters relating to your child please contact the College.

### Drop Off Zones

To provide a safe environment in and around the Main Street Campus parents/carers need to ensure that any dropping off of students in the car park (especially near exit section) is done as quickly as possible to avoid blocking the car park for staff and other students leaving the car park. Additionally, please be aware that parking near the exit gate of the car park can restrict the vision of vehicles leaving.

### PROSPER Framework

A new positive education framework that I have introduced on Main Street is called PROSPER. This framework is based on students (and staff) focussing on the following aspects of their involvement in the Emmaus College community: Positivity, Relationships, Outcomes, Strengths, Purpose, Engagement, Resilience. Over the coming weeks I will develop this concept with the students and also share with you an explanation of each aspect of the framework to allow you the opportunity to engage in a conversation with your son/daughter and how they might apply this to their lives.

**POSITIVITY** for students means experiencing positive emotions at school such as feeling safe, a sense of belonging, interest, contentment and cheerfulness and experiencing a sense of fun and amusement, gratitude and appreciation, a capacity for mindfulness and skills in optimistic thinking.

**Encouraging Positivity** means providing opportunities for students to experience and amplify positive emotions and build positive learning environments. For example implementing curriculum that raises students' curiosity and highly engaging, using music, dance, cooperative learning tasks, teaching mindfulness and optimistic thinking.

**RELATIONSHIPS** for students refers to students experiencing ongoing positive relationships with peers and teachers; for parents it means experiencing ongoing positive relationship with teachers and the school; and for teachers it means experiencing ongoing positive relationships with their students and other school staff. Building Relationships means teaching pro-social values (such as kindness, friendliness, cooperation) and social skills (such as listening, turn taking, negotiating and respectful disagreeing). It also means identifying and implementing school-based structures and practices that facilitate these positive relationships such as cooperative learning groups, cross-age teams, peer mentoring, cooperative games and performance groups.

These awards are both fun and challenging and help participants aged from 11 ½ years to build confidence and resilience. There are two levels of The Bridge Award – Level One and Level Two. There are three levels of The Duke of Edinburgh – Bronze, Silver and Gold. At Emmaus College, we are offering the opportunity for students to gain Bridge Award Level 1 or the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Level depending on the age of the student. We will be using the expertise and facilities of **Camp Fairbairn Outdoor Education Session** for the Adventurous journey aspect of the Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award.


