

From the Archives

Farm St just a few blocks north of the college was so named because the founder of one of the oldest drapery stores in the city and a furniture store, James Stewart owned a farm in that area. Thozet Rd is named for Monsieur Thozet a famous botanist in the Rockhampton area who grew cotton, coffee, sugar at his experimental nursery in Kalka in the 1860s (source McDonald LM, Rockhampton: A History of City and District, p352).

Engage At Emmaus College

In recent years Emmaus has run a very successful Good to Great Programme. Here pupils have worked very closely with staff on Social Justice Issues in an attempt to foster a greater enthusiasm for

independent learning whilst looking specifically at the key skills of

This year we are seeking to take this a bit further, we want to provide specific guidance for pupils, to set and discuss stretch and attainable targets. We would like to work with parents to identify appropriate intervention strategies at home to facilitate effective home study. We hope to enable pupils to study more effectively and develop effective time management strategies. Basically we want to create an environment which is positive full of encouragement and allows pupils of all ability to maximize their potential.

So how will it work?

Each Pupil will be assigned a mentor, this mentor will have a preliminary meeting with the pupil and parent at the start of Term 4. Previous performance and potential together barriers to learning or progress will be discussed. Targets will be set and regularly reviewed. Pupils will be asked to keep a reflective diary throughout the time.

On Tuesday mornings all participants will gather at 6.30am to engage in a physical fitness programme. Here, the pupils will set themselves targets and strive to beat or surpass them the following week. Guest speakers will also address pupils at this time over breakfast.

On Tuesday and Thursday afternoons there will be study sessions in Yaamba Road Library, here the pupils will initially work to a deadline on a social justice issue, and engaging in peer review and critical self-reflection. This session will run from 3.10pm to 4.10 pm. After Week Five pupils will then be encouraged to engage in silent but effective supervised study at this time.

Week Eight will see the end of Engage and a review of the process/programme will take place.

Engineering Aspirations Program

Emmaus College students have participated in a three day Engineering Aspirations Program this month, giving the budding engineers the opportunity to participate in real-world scenarios

and appreciate the range of challenges faced by the engineering profession.

The 2016 program marked the second year partner organisations including CQUniversity, the Department of Transport and Main Roads and Emmaus College have combined to offer students the opportunity to experience working in the Engineering sector while still in high school.

“Emmaus College is extremely grateful to our industry partners for the planning and unique hands-on activities showcased over the three days of the program,” Emmaus College Workplace Learning and Careers Coordinator Ms Narelle Sommerfeld said.

“We regard the program as mutually beneficial to students, employers, and Emmaus College through the widening of participation between industry and the education sectors. The program facilitates further interest in careers within the engineering sector, and enables students to make informed decisions regarding their career pathways.”

For two days of this year’s program, 20 students attended presentations and participated in hands-on workshops facilitated by academic staff at CQUniversity’s faculty of Engineering and Built Environment. Students conducted electrical circuit mapping and design, soil classification testing, concrete mix design and flexural beam tests.

On the final day of the program, students joined the Department of Transport and Main Roads to gain practical insight into the diversity of the engineering industry by participating in survey activities, materials testing, project planning, and practical activities facilitated by recently graduated engineers and designers who mentored the students throughout the day.

A visit to the recently completed \$170 million Yeppen South project concluded the three-day program, bringing together all the learnings from the practical exercises.

Transport and Main Roads District Director in Rockhampton, Peter Trim, said the Engineering Aspirations Program continued to be a fantastic opportunity for developing and shaping the career path of future engineers.

“We were pleased to be involved again in the 2016 Engineering Work Aspirations program driven by Emmaus College,” Mr Trim said.

“This was a great opportunity for TMR as well, allowing us to showcase the detailed work we do to build the roads and bridges people drive on every day.

“I congratulate Emmaus College on developing such an innovative program, which will guide the future of their students.”

Semester 1 overdue books

There are quite a number of overdue books from Semester 1 still outstanding. ID Cards: The policy of the Library for the printing and charging of New ID Cards

Students must have their ID card to print, it is not the role of the library staff to print student assignments. If students forget their ID card they are given 2 chances where the library will release their printing for them and it is noted in a book.

When the student forgets for a third time a new card will be printed and charged to the student's school fee account.

Graphic Novels in the Library

The library has a variety of Graphic Novels for all students to enjoy, each library has age appropriate titles which can be

borrowed just like a book. If you are not quite sure what a graphic novel is here is some more information.

What are graphic novels?

In this context, the word "graphic" does not mean "adult" or "explicit." Graphic novels are books written and illustrated in the style of a comic book. The term graphic novel was first popularized by Will Eisner to distinguish his book *A Contract with God* (1978) from collections of newspaper comic strips. He described graphic novels as consisting of "sequential art"—a series of illustrations which, when viewed in order, tell a story.

Although today's graphic novels are a recent phenomenon, this basic way of storytelling has been used in various forms for centuries—early cave drawings, hieroglyphics, and medieval tapestries like the famous Bayeux Tapestry can be thought of as stories told in pictures. The term graphic novel is now generally used to describe any book in a comic format that resembles a novel in length and narrative development.

Are graphic novels suitable for the young, and how do I evaluate them?

Some parents, educators, and librarians may associate the term "graphic novel" with content that is not suitable for young readers. They may not yet be familiar with the growing body of graphic novels that are suitable for all ages, including children.

Reviews and round-ups of new graphic novels appear regularly in School Library Journal, Booklist, Kirkus Reviews, Voice of Youth Advocates, Library Media Connection, Publishers Weekly, and other journals. By reading these reviews, seeking the advice of trusted colleagues and vendors, and previewing materials prior to circulation, you can build a collection that is suited to your audience.
