A MESSAGE FROM FATHER MATTHEW



4th Sunday Easter – Good Shepherd
Sunday

Acts 2:14, 36-41, 1 Peter 2:20-25, John
10:1-10

As we gather for Eucharist, on this Good Shepherd Sunday, it is: World Day of Prayer for Vocations. I think to myself what does the future hold for our Church; what will it look like next year, 5 years, 10 years down the track?

What will it look like, I do not know, but this church has many people in it here now, you all have a story to tell and a journey of faith that you have experienced. There are many good people as I look around, both young and old and I think to myself what does the future hold for our Church: it holds you, and I challenge you here today to imagine what it looks like *for you!* **Imagine you living out your faith** in such a way that **people can see the person of Jesus Christ lived out in your life** and want to join this church with you.

What it looks like is experiencing a personal relationship with Jesus, not something that you take from here, but something that you give here – to each other – to those you love, a relationship which calls each of us by name to make a difference. To make a difference so that when church is mentioned it is not something that is a chore but is a family coming together in their struggles to share with each other their faith. To make a difference at work where you stand up for what is right and just, instead of looking the other way. To make a difference at home when looking to find direction or answers, we look to prayer and a relationship with Jesus to find the way, where we do not close the door to each other. It looks like you being alive with your faith in a Jesus not from a time past, but of right now in your hearts, to be alive with enthusiasm regardless of how hard or difficult life may seem. It is forgiveness, it is compassion, it is mercy.

I ask myself why me? What is it that draws me on and into priesthood? The answer is that YOU DO. While there are people in our community living, loving and forgiving each other, God is in our midst and calls each of us in our own way to respond.

I would describe the journey as **radically different** to what I thought my life was going to be. A sheep farmer from the west becoming a priest! It would seem the most ridiculous thing to do to become a priest in these times, everything society says or promotes would say **NO don't do it**. There is no need for church or religion in our time or in our life, it has no meaning.

Reading the signs of the times I would say now more than ever **we need the family and people to witness a way of love which calls us to a radical new way of life not just for ourselves but for all**.

It is the sharing of our love for each other and commitment to our faith which counts and if we stop asking the question: **"have you thought about life as a priest or religious,"** we will not recognize the Jesus who calls each of us forward: the Jesus who in the lives of priests and religious before us who have shared their faith and commitment to a way of life. **Families have been witnesses to the calling of these people. God has called them through your witness and your love.** It is a radical commitment and way of life not simply as priest or religious but as a people who go out to each other and share faith with each other. God challenges us to respond to this love in some way. I continue on this journey because of you and your witness.

This is your vocation – this is what inspires and encourages people – encourages *your children – the people that you know* – **to want to become ministers amongst you.** To lead community in prayer and worship – to be called forward by you from within this church – from within your schools – your workplaces – your families. This is our vocation to priesthood – this is our journey – because this is our church.

We pray for vocations, for priests and religious and we think that that is enough. It is not. We also need to respond with our actions, with what we do. Who here has asked their own son or daughter to think about a commitment to life as an ordained minister or religious? Who has asked a friend or colleague, a grandchild have they thought about this type of commitment to priesthood or religious life?

Our church is not perfect, it is not meant to be, so what it will look like in 5 years time: is what and how you live your faith; what it will look like is you and me, together discovering and living in relationship with Jesus. **Living it out today**, inspiring and being witnesses of your faith, to say yes we can and are doing this, and with a little imagining and hope, **together our church will look like us, living the faith.**

Let's live that faith and have the courage to bring it to life, to imagine what it might look like, and have you the courage to live it out!

NAPLAN

Our Year 7s and 9s will now be ready for a well-deserved break from NAPLAN testing on Tuesday – Thursday. I thank them for their hard work and for our staff in supporting our students especially Mr Simon Warren for his excellent organisation of this series of tests.

SCHOOL IMPROVEMENT SURVEYS

Attached to this newsletter is a letter that I have sent to all parents via an SMS link earlier in the week. The survey period begins next Monday 15 May and concludes on Friday 26 May. Your completion of this short survey is greatly appreciated and is an important part of our planning for school improvement.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT CHANGES CREATE UNCERTAINTY FOR SCHOOL FUNDING

Over the last week you will have heard significant discussion in the media about school funding and Catholic schools in particular. The funding package announced by the Prime Minister and the Education Minister includes a number of changes that should be of concern to us as a Catholic school community.

While the package includes a base funding increase beyond what had previously been proposed by the Federal

Government, it also alluded to a number of changes to the existing funding system which may impact on the overall level of funding to Queensland Catholic schools. The Catholic education sector is concerned the Federal Government has, to date, been unable to provide the necessary detail to allay concerns about potential funding reductions.

Some key points of concern include:

- The absolute failure of the Federal Government to consult with the Catholic sector before announcing its proposed changes
- The lack of detail and so a heightened sense of uncertainty about our future funding position
- Proposed changes to the funding model which target Catholic school systems and which will potentially reduce our funding and impact on fee levels in schools.

The Catholic education sector has urged the Federal Government to urgently meet Catholic education representatives to provide more detail about how the proposed changes will impact on schools, teachers and parents and to negotiate an acceptable outcome.

Accompanying this newsletter is some information about the Catholic Education sector's concerns about the model of funding for education released prior to the budget on Tuesday night.

QUALITY SCHOOLS

You may have seen or heard recent media coverage about the Federal Government's Quality Schools website which purports to show what federal funding flows to our school.

The model used to generate the figures does not accurately show actual funding received by our school. The 2017 figures for our school have been generated using projections and assumptions which the Government has not fully disclosed to Catholic School Authorities. The projections must therefore be viewed with considerable caution. Furthermore, the Government's projections do not take into account the way Catholic schools operate as a system. The Government recognises the benefit of local knowledge and allows the Catholic sector to redirect funding to ensure that these locally identified areas of particular need for students and schools are most appropriately supported. This enables our Catholic systems to most effectively provide students in all our schools with the best possible opportunities for success.

WHOOPING COUGH

Information has been received that indicates there are possible cases of whooping cough in both the college community and the wider community. Whooping cough may start like a cold with a runny nose and sneezing, and then develop into the characteristic cough. It is suggested that parents remind children of the following hygiene practices:


- stay home when you are sick;
- wash your hands frequently with soap and water or hand gel;
- wash your hands prior to touching your eyes, nose and mouth;
- when coughing or sneezing, cover your mouth and nose with disposable tissues which should be disposed of immediately;
- don't share items such as glasses or cups, lipstick, toys or anything which could be contaminated with respiratory secretions;
- maintain at least one metre distance from people who have flu-like symptoms such as coughing or sneezing.





In preparation for this change staff and students are involved in a wide range of trials managed by Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority. In Week 7 this term (Friday 2 June), our Year 11 Visual Arts and Physical Education students will be involved in assessment trials that will assist in the preparation of students, professional development of staff and the testing of systems and processes. More information for parents, carers and students will be available as the term progresses.

SENIOR SCHOOLING UPDATE

One outcome of the change of schedule was an extension of two days for report writing. This was necessary for teachers who needed to collect and mark exams before being able to finalise reports.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank the many people who were a part of that rescheduling of exams including Administration staff who were in the Main Street Office during the term break, senior management persons who enabled changes to reporting and timetabling, and teachers who found times for their students to catch up, in particular for the students who missed more than one exam. It was very much a sense of community effort to support the successful completion of exams for both the students and their teachers.

At the meeting on Friday the students were advised of what to wear and pack for the 3 day trip. A letter to parents/carers will go out at the beginning of next week with departure and arrival times for our flights from Rockhampton and return from Brisbane.


